

Racism in the classroom How do I respond?

"Racism exists within our institutions and because so many white people deny it, and so many people of colour are uncomfortable discussing it for fear of the inevitable backlash it brings, and thanks to the myth of the meritocracy, this in turn perpetuates racism within our society." - Luke Pearson

Racism impacts on people's health, education, employment, safety and sense of self. Racism hurts and it is entrenched within Universities.

So how many First Nations peoples are trying to learn in racist classrooms?

Racism presents itself in the classroom directly and indirectly when:

- First Nations students are called upon to be the spokespeople for Aboriginal peoples.
- First Nations people are spoken about as though they are not in the room.
- First Nations voices are not heard in the space.
- Comments like "you speak so well for an Aboriginal person", "you're only here because you are Aboriginal" or "you don't look Aboriginal" are made.
- Students choose to be ignorant and educators shy away from truth telling.
- Students make comments that are racist, discriminatory or prejudice.
